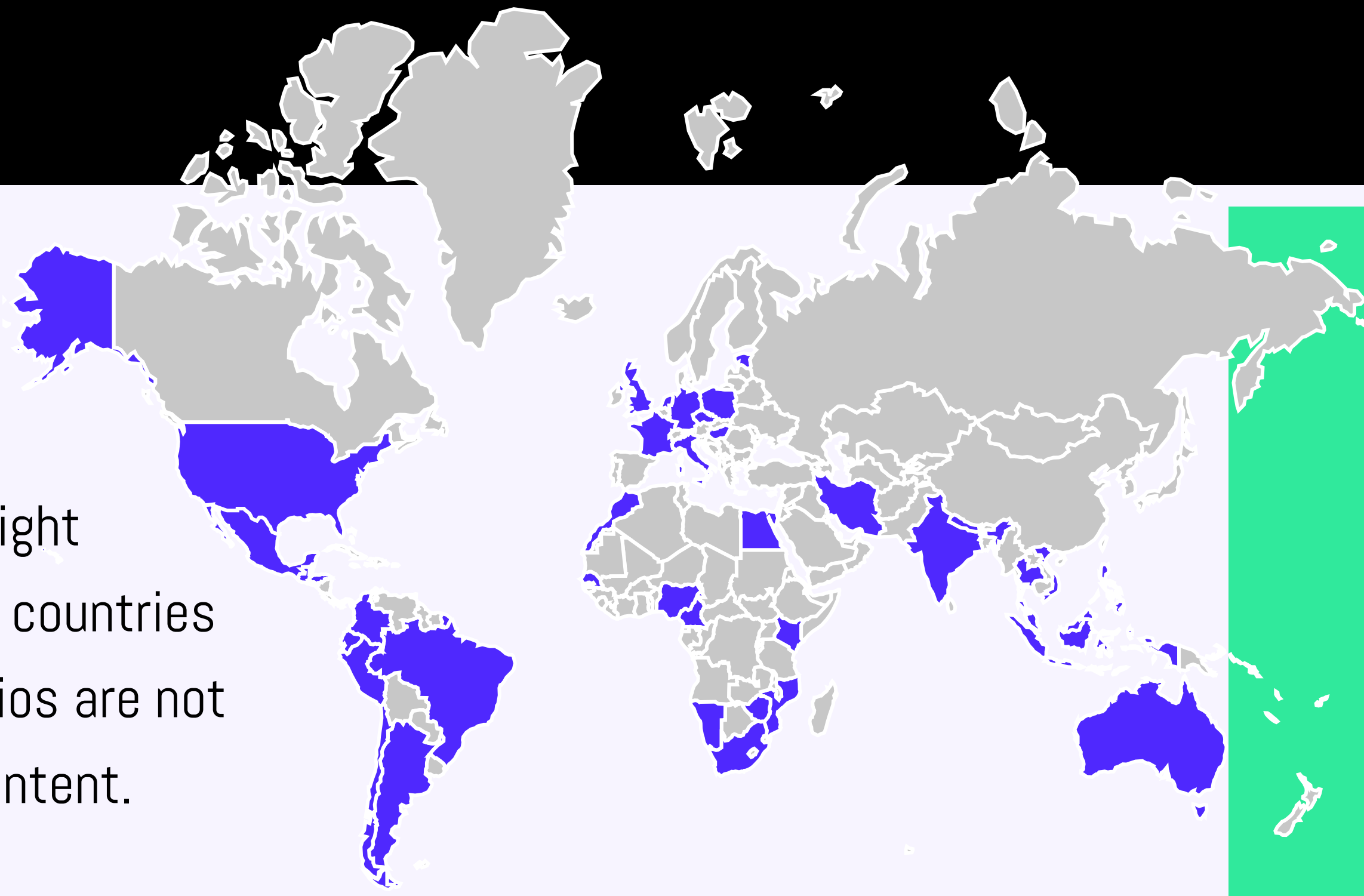
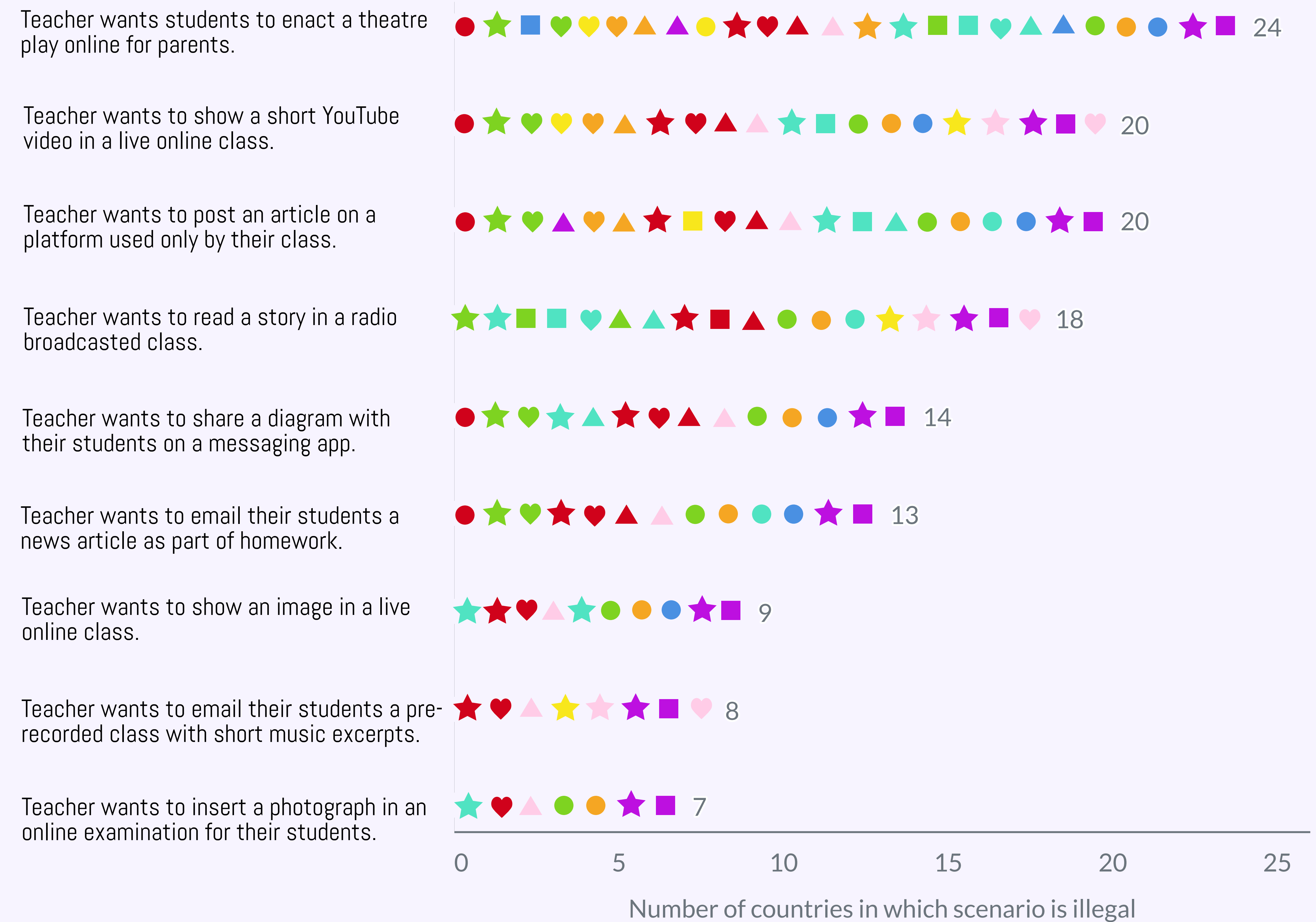


Digital copyright laws and online teaching



A new report from Education International assesses whether copyright limitations for educational purposes are unfit for remote education through a legal analysis of copyright laws in 40 countries.
